IN THE LAST 100 YEARS...

There have been over 400 onscreen stories where a character considers getting an abortion.



Depictions in film & television <u>don't</u> represent real life experiences.

Onscreen, about 10% of characters who get an abortion die as a result of the procedure.

In real life, the mortality rate is actually: 0.001%






(onscreen vs. reality)

This results in abortion seeming much more dangerous than it is in real life.



Characters represented on TV are, in general, whiter, younger, and wealthier than their real-life counterparts.





characters considering abortion on TV can contribute to stigma in communities of color.

Underrepresenting Black and Latina

Characters who were already parents were dramatically

underrepresented among characters choosing abortion.
